RE: Investigation Report File ATP-ADJ-2022-02-053

The Department of Environment is in receipt of the Information and Privacy Commissioner (IPC)'s August 05, 2022 report and recommendations concerning file ATP-ADJ-2022-02-053. This letter serves as the Department of Environment's notice, as required under Section 104 of the Access to Information and Protection of Privacy Act (ATIPP Act) (2018), within the required 15 business days of receiving the report.

Decision

The department has reviewed and considered the report and recommendations. We determined that the implications and consequences of the 3 recommendations to disclose the data remain significant. The Department of Environment is rejecting the recommendations outlined within the IPC's report.

Rationale

As detailed in our submissions to the above-noted file, the release of the requested information will have significant implications for meeting our mandated responsibility to co-manage, protect and conserve grizzly bears on the Yukon North Slope. Our Inuvialuit co-management partners have been very clear in their opposition to the release of location data, including GPS collar data, for Yukon North Slope grizzly bears. We have provided a letter in our submission, from the Wildlife Management Advisory Council (North Slope) (WMAC NS), stating that the release of the data would be detrimental to our co-management relationships and it will be regarded as a breach of trust if the department unilaterally releases the information without Inuvialuit participation.

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Should the data be released without proper data-sharing agreements, which we have proposed, and without Inuvialuit participation, we risk significant damage to long-standing relationships with Inuvialuit management and co-management partners in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region. Further, making sensitive data publicly available without proper consent or constraints will disempower Inuvialuit partners in the stewardship and co-management of the North Slope grizzly bear population. This will infringe the Inuvialuit Final Agreement (IFA).

Appeal

Pursuant to Section 105 of the ATIPP Act, you may apply to the Court for a review of the decision in relation to the recommendations made within 30 business days of receiving this notice.

I am aware of the gravity and importance of the recommendations from your inquiry, and I assure you we share your interests in promoting transparency and information-sharing.
